


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Acknowledgement of traditional owners

Community Legal Centres South Australia Inc. Overview

Community Legal Centres South Australia Inc. (CLCSA) is the peak body representing independent, community-led community legal centres operating across South Australia, including rural and remote areas. CLCSA provide free information, legal assistance and referral, representation and casework, community education and advocacy for vulnerable clients who are facing legal and social problems.

Established in 1993, our mission is to work with our centres towards a fair and just South Australia. We help community legal centres to provide effective, high-quality services to their communities. We help the network of community legal centres keep informed, united and relevant. We help disadvantaged and vulnerable people in the community to understand their legal and human rights, access legal help, and feel heard and respected.

During this reporting period, Community Legal Centres South Australia's members helped 11,278 individuals (+19% since the last reporting period) with over 22,187 legal and non-legal services across South Australia

- 13,060 legal advices (+35%)
- 452 court/tribunal services (+21%)
- assisting with over 1,699 legal tasks
- providing ongoing assistance for over 757 other representation services
- assisting with 100 dispute resolution and facilitated resolution services
- helping with over 2,773 other support services, such as social work and financial counselling
- 1,840 informations
- 1,195 referrals

Support was also provided in engaging with both Commonwealth and State Governments to ensure ongoing financial support to members in their endearvour to support those most vulnerable members of our community. I would like to acknowledge the work undertaken by Community Legal Centres Australia and our fellow State and Territory Peaks that have come together to advocate for greater resources to ensure our communities continue to receive much needed assistance.

It has been a pleasure again to work with the small but amazing team at CLCSA, the Executive and our members. A great deal was achieved this year because of the dedication and hard work of the sector in SA. I would also like to acknowledge the support of staff from the Attorney-General's Department and Law Society of SA and our ongoing collaboration with Legal Services Commission SA.

Sector Development Officer Report

The year that began with uncertainly, and some pessimism about the impact COVID-19, 2021 provided opportunity for the sector members to demonstrate resilience and adaptability so that the most vulnerable and disadvantaged people across South Australia continue to access quality, legal services that they deserve.

A feature during this reporting period has been our sectors ability to innovate and embrace technology to continue to serve our clients. Working from home was no longer something we might do someday, but was a necessity to keep our Centres operating along with updating our business continuation plans, provision of professional and well-being support for mangers, staff and volunteers alike through seminars delivered through Blue Knot.

One unanticipated aspect of the pandemic was that it provided clarity of purpose for the work of CLCSA. With the support of Centres and strategic plan the coming years will continue to strengthen our institutional relationships including our National and interstate sector counterparts.

This reporting period also commenced the much needed constitutional and business reform review and we engaged experts in the field to support our endeavours, this is expected to be completed by the next reporting period.

In terms of significant projects this reporting period, CLCSA commenced intensive outreaches to Kangaroo Island and Yorke Peninsula in response to the 2020-21 Black Summer Bushfires Disaster. Through the Commonwealth Legal Assistance package, CLCSA appointed a dedicated outreach Bushfire Legal lawyer to support recovery in the communities impacted. Currently we have completed 2 of the 4 phase project that has delivered a program logic, environmental and risk assessment, weekly outreaches, identification and advice on immediate/forecast legal needs and an office space co-located within the Recovery Centre at Parndana (KI). The 3rd phase is to continue the provision of outreach legal advice and through community collaboration, offer innovative community legal education and practical tools to support recovery and resilience. This project expected to run until the end of December 2021 and will be evaluated by Flinders University.

In keeping with the collaboration theme, CLCSA also has been developing with the members and community stakeholders across education, social services, Councils and multicultural organisations enhanced online resources in different languages, identifying unmet legal need and reinvigorated community communication strategy through traditional and social media.

I conclude this report by acknowledging that CLCSA Directors, members, colleagues, volunteers and supporters in the sector for their continued support, dedication and passion in supporting the peak.
